"Lemonade and Light: Holidays of Spring"


About thirty women gathered at CNY RISE Center on April 16th to learn more about the spring holidays celebrated in different faith traditions. Joann Cook spoke about Buddha's Birthday which is traditionally celebrated on April 8th and our group re-enacted the story surrounding the Baby Buddha's birth. Carol Lipson spoke about the Jewish traditions of Passover as celebrated here and in Israel. Lorraine Markley shared the Catholic traditions around the 40 days of Lent culminating in Easter celebrations in churches filled with music and decorations. Cher Holt-Fortin introduced many of us to Baha'i – the last revealed religion founded in the 1800's by Baha'u'llah. Baha'i teaches that all major religions are manifestations of one God and champions unity and equality of all people. Baha'i celebrates Naw-Ruz – the Persian New Year—on March 21st and holds a 12-day festival of Ridvan later in the Spring commemorating important events in the life of Baha'u'llah. Melek Yavuz spoke about the Muslim holy month of Ramadan in which fasting, prayer, and charity lead believers closer to Allah. Ramadan may fall at any time during the year, but in 2023 it coincided with Passover and Easter – as well as Buddha's Birthday and Naw- Ruz. Many attendees remarked on the similarities between these joyous Spring festivals – including family gatherings, Spring flowers, special foods and fellowship!

My Grandmother Asked Me to Tell You She's Sorry by Fredrik Backman





REFUGEE SEWING




Jennifer reports:
