


#### Memorial Day — May 27

#### Biting the Hand: Growing Up Asian in Black and White America by Julia Lee

Julia Lee is angry. And she has questions. What does it mean to be Asian in America? What does it look like to be an ally or an accomplice? How can we shatter the structures of white supremacy that fuel racial stratification?

When Julia was fifteen, her hometown went up in smoke during the 1992 Los Angeles riots. The daughter of Korean immigrant store owners in a predominantly Black neighborhood, Julia was taught to be grateful for the privilege afforded to her. However, the acquittal of four white police officers in the beating of Rodney King, following the murder of Latasha Harlins by a Korean shopkeeper, forced Julia to question her racial identity and complicity. She was neither Black nor white. So who was she?

The WTB book club is an egalitarian community of women from many faith and cultural traditions. We seek to nurture mutual respect and understanding by reading about diverse beliefs, customs, and practices. We choose books - fiction, non-fiction, and memoir - that reflect diversity of faith and culture, either internationally or within our own country. #### **REFUGEE SEWING**

We are coming to the close of Thursday sewing classes. Students will receive machines to practice on at the May 2 class, then they will be stored until the next week to continue practicing threading, extra stitches, and bobbin winding.

On May 9 students will choose what they want from several boxes of fabrics, laces, embellishments, ribbon, plastic cases, etc. We will provide large bags to carry their treasures along with the machines that they are taking home. Then the teachers will visit far away family, garden, and relax until classes resume in September. We already have six names on the waiting list. Meanwhile, I continue to receive calls from newly arrived refugees who already know how to sew. I take these seamstresses (usually but not always women) a machine and fabric and give them a lesson in their own home about the details of this donated machine, stressing that every machine is different and that they really need this lesson. They have my phone number and sometimes call me to ask for more fabric or other sewing notions. If I have what they need, I stop by to deliver. It's important that these new arrivals feel welcomed by Americans who are not paid to help them. If you have anything to donate, yes I collect and sort during

Finally, in what has become our second home, we settled in the United States of America.

In all places we've been, we learned to cook different types of food. Since arriving in Update New York in August of 2005, it's been my dream to open a restaurant and share my love of African cuisine with the local community. After many years of planning and perseverance, my dream finally came true in October of 2017. My story is similar to the stories of many who came to this country before me to find better lives for themselves and for their children.

#### **Explanation:**

#### Who Is Eligible?

- A young woman who is enrolled in an Onondaga County high school and who will graduate in 2024
- She shall have demonstrated, through service, her understanding of and commitment to interfaith and intercultural diversity
- She plans to continue her post-high-school education in a certificate program, a trade school, or a 2-year or 4-year college or university
- Eligibility for this award is not limited by academic (GPA) or financial considerations
